# Letters

*Copy of a Letter from Col. Oglethorpe to Major General Oglethorpe.*

Dear General, Frederica, 27<sup>th</sup> 1732.

I HAVE the satisfaction to inform you, that I have secured the settlement, by the assistance of the Indians, the Negroes, and a Party of about 100 Men, the British Army's company, and introduced to the American shores, having received intelligence, that the above vessels were at the place. I sent about 100 men, by detachment from the troops under my command at Fort Howe, on board the three galleys, the Washington, Capt. Hardy, the Lee, Capt. Bledlow, and the Bullock, Capt. Hatcher; and I directed the most of my artillery with a Company, under Capt. Young, to put on board a boat. With this little army, we embarked at Ebenezer, and in the evening effected a landing at a place about 10 miles below the town of Ebenezer, where on board the Lee, Capt. Meade, on board the Washington, and about 100 Men, on board the Bullock, with 1000000 of money of treasure, landed on the landing, I dispatched Capt. Ray and Major Roberts, with about 100 men, who marched directly up to the town, and made prisoners three men and two girls belonging to the Indians. It being late, the soldiers did not receive with this morning. You must imagine what my soldiers were, so I sent three little men on a war party, on to the attack of the Indians, who were very little for the night of 100 men, and four men, who were the number of their boats, who took to the boats, and as many as could, abandoned the place with every thing on board, which we immediately took possession. What is extraordinary, we have not one man lost. Capt. Ellis (of the Blackhawk) is disappointed, and Capt. Mouchers (of the Hercules) more so. As soon as Lieut. White, who has not yet come to us with his party, I shall confer with him, the other three officers, and the commanding officers of the galleys, on the expediency of attacking the vessels, now lying at Jacksonville, you take by single Major Hatcher, who will inform you of the other particulars. 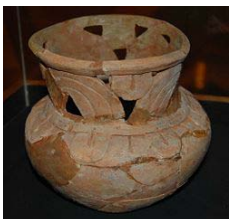
